



Importing Personal Property Into CHAD

IMPORTING HOUSEHOLD GOODS AND PERSONAL EFFECTS

REQUIRED DOCUMENTS:

- ✓ packing list in French
- ✓ Copy of valid passport
- ✓ Original Bill of Lading (no express release accepted)/AWB
- ✓ Detailed inventory in French dated, valued and signed by the shipper
- ✓ Invoices for the electrical and hi-fi appliances and for all the items bought less than 6 months before the shipment's arrival
- ✓ Letter from the employer explaining that the client is starting a new contract in Chad
- ✓ Non sale certificate (declaration that the client will not sell his or her HHG's)

Note:

- All documents must be express mailed 15 days before shipment's arrival in order for the shipper's employer to apply for the possible duty free exemption certificate.
- Certificate of Free Entry must be obtained from the Custom's Head Office. These shipments are subjected to 2% customs tax "taxe statistique"
- Household goods shipments without Free Entry are subjected to 70% customs taxes based on the inventory value
- Shipper should expect that all cartons in shipment will be opened and checked by customs

IMPORTING MOTOR VEHICLES:

- Shipper must present the necessary documents approximately one month prior to shipment's arrival due to long custom's procedures
- Chassis number and weight of vehicle must be stated on the OBL

REQUIRED DOCUMENTS:

- Original registration card
- Invoice of motor vehicle
- Non sale Certificate
- Letter from the employer explaining that the client is starting a new contract in Chad

RESTRICTED/PROHIBITED ITEMS

- Firearms and ammunition
- Unlawful drugs
- Alcohol must include the mention "fond de cave" (less than 30 bottles) to be acceptable and duty free
